From Our Prez:

Reflections on 2017

2017 was an outstanding year for PPHS. With donations from 28 members and sale proceeds of the donated lots in Victor, we were able to reduce our PPHS Museum Mortgage to just below \$34,000. This means less of our future budget will go to interest, and the final mortgage payoff is closer in sight to us.

The October Auction slightly exceeded our target revenues thanks to efforts of a group of volunteers and support of the Teller County community and businesses.

Dedicated volunteers repainted the outside of the Teacherage and are working on repainting the interior.

We had a record number of visitors to the museum, and good donations in the gift shop and donation box. We welcomed school groups and Count DePourtales descendants to the Museum, and began a more structured partnership with the Florissant Library.

Progress is being made on the Pioneer Cemetery remapping, the kiosk, and Florissant stone signs have been groomed and beautiful flowers brightened Florissant last summer.

New volunteers are taking on the newsletter, as you'll see in this issue.

We got help from "old timers" who continue to assist, but also saw some new faces pitching in to help. Thanks to the enthusiastic docents in the museum, and all the volunteers and members for your efforts and support given this past year.

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The Midland Depot at Divide

A request for old railroad tracks and ties went out in the Ute Country News in January. The request was made because exciting things are planned for the Midland Depot building in Divide. The folks at the Teller Historic and Environmental Coalition and Midland Days at Divide are planning to create a run of track along the Colorado Midland grade where the depot is located. The tracks, set to go in this summer, are a step forward in fulfilling a master plan for the old depot.

In 1887, the Colorado Midland Railway added a depot in Divide to house an agent and a telegraph office. The first depot burned, and the current building was built to replace it in 1904. Our depot building actually served two railroads at one point. There were tracks that ran on both the north and south sides of the building. Since the illustrious days of the railroad, the depot has been a family home, an antique shop, and a roadhouse and biker bar. A local Divide developer rescued the building from demolition in 1999.

Current plans are to restore the old building and add interpretive exhibits and a visitor's center to be managed by the Divide Chamber of Commerce. A brick platform will one day surround the depot. These exciting plans also include a section of track, informational kiosks, trailhead facilities, a pavilion, and picnic grounds.

In The Cemetery:

Civil War Veterans

Several Civil War veterans or family members are buried in the Florissant Pioneer Cemetery. All applied for pensions as invalids from the United States government; copies of these applications are on file in the Museum resource room.

One such applicant was David S. Portis. Born in Lancaster, Indiana, in 1842, David joined the Union forces, enlisting in the 14th Indiana Light Artillery Battery. David's first battlefield engagement occured at Pittsburg Landing on the Tennessee River near a small meeting house named Shiloh. On April 6 & 7, 1862, the largest battle fought on American soil took place there. The North won the battle, but all Americans were shocked by the casualties--23,746 dead or wounded, surpassing all the casualties in the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, and the Mexican War combined.

Conditions on the battlefield were unhealthy. Over a week passed before bodies were buried. Injured soldiers were treated in makeshift hospitals, with piles of amputated limbs outside. Water supplies were contaminated. Disease was rampant. David came down with diarrhea, which plagued him the rest of his life. He was but one of many. By 1865, the sick rate for diarrhea and dysentary was 995 out of 1000. David was in and out of hospitals, and when being transfered from one to another, he was in a train wreck and injured his leg. In spite of chronic illness and injury, David served with his unit in five more engagements: the Seige of Corinth, Battle of Brice's Crossroads, Battle of Nashvile, Battle of the Spanish Fort, and Battle of Fort Blakely. Before being mustered out in 1865, David was again hospitalized for pneumonia and chronic lung disease.

Returning to Indiana, David married a local girl, Sarah A. Frame. David's lung disease worsened, so in 1880 David and his wife moved to Colorado, hoping that the dry air would improve David's health. With their four children they farmed and ranched near Rocky, Colorado.

But David was ailing. The rigors of pioneer life, combined with the chronic illnesses contracted in the Civil War, made it increasingly difficult for him to farm and ranch successfully. At age 46, David applied for an invalid pension. He received \$8.00 a month. This sum was raised to \$12.00 a month by the time of his death in 1899.

David is buried in Row 8 of the Florissant Pioneer Cemetery. A U.S. Government Civil War headstone marks his final resting place.

FLORISSANT PIONEER CEMETERY

Florissant's cemetery received its first permanent "guest" in 1874. This is not surprising, since the town of Florissant was established by Judge James Castello in 1870. What is surprising, however, is that Frank, James' son, waited until 1886 to incorporate a Florissant Cemetery Association. This was probably in anticipation of the boom that would come to the area with the arrival of the Midland Railroad. The Pikes Peak Historical Society maintains this tradition of stewardship with its management of the Florissant Pioneer Cemetery on behalf of Teller County. If you meet the residency requirements; you may also secure a final resting place in this historic cemetery. Donations of \$300 are requested for a full burial, and only \$150 for cremains.

Our Cemetery Committee manages the 1874 Florissant Pioneer Cemetery on behalf of Teller County. Our Beautification Committee sponsors an area-wide clean-up each spring and plants flowers throughout the town of Florissant. Our Chautauqua Committee sponsors free educational programs during the year and our Tree Committee researches and records Native American Culturally Scarred Trees. In addition, we maintain a fund for returning representatives of the Ute tribe to their sacred mountain, Tava, each year. If you become a Docent (Museum Volunteer), you act as host at the Museum, and meet wonderful, exciting people from all over the world.
